If yes, give a brief descripiton and a list of modules currently operational (maximum 500 words)	The College has a partial Management Information System that has been integrated into the college website for collection, storage and dissemination of information. Currently it consists of two modules viz., Spectra and Dhempe Learn. Spectra comprises of reporting of activities carried out by individual staff members on regular basis to the Principal. It consists of academic details, cocurricular activity reports, research outputs, etc. Dhempe Learn is a MOODLE platform to store and disseminate study material to students and also for internal evaluation process. The MIS also includes monthly reports by Heads of Departments and conveners of various committees to the

Principal. The reports essentially contain a concise monthly account of curricular, cocurricular and extracurricular activities organized/attended by teachers/students of the respective departments. The departmental reports are compiled and a summative monthly report is filed by the Principal to the Management. Such reports are generally forwarded to the Principal/Trustees by email. The Heads of Departments also submit monthly attendance of the students to the Principal which are forwarded to the Goa University by email.

Part B

CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The curriculum of B.A., B.Sc. and M. Sc. (Analytical Chemistry) Programme prescribed by Goa University is implemented by the college. The curriculum based on Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) was followed with effect from June 2017 in a phased manner. It is delivered by the college through a PDCA (Plan-Do-Check-Act) mechanism. This broadly involves the following: Before the commencement of each semester, the time-table committee prepares general timetables/academic schedules which are circulated to all Heads of Departments (HoDs). The academic schedule includes the schedule of internal tests and assignments. The HoDs prepare the departmental time-table based on the general time-table. Teaching/academic work is allocated to the respective departmental staff along with other duties and responsibilities. Each faculty member prepares an academic lesson plan to be approved by the HoD. Lessons are delivered as per the approved plan. The HoD, the Vice-Principal and the Principal monitor the delivery of lectures and completion of syllabus. If, on account of any exigency, a lecture cannot be held as per the notified plan, it is rescheduled with proper justification duly recorded in the documented plan, and with the approval of the head of the department concerned. Each faculty member also prepares plans for delivery of the course, including usage of education technology (Moodle, Flipped Learning, Google Classroom, online learning resources, etc.), field trips, industrial visits, internships, seminars, theatre in learning, role plays, etc. Each department also notifies schedule for skill development courses (value added courses) which are designed by the departmental faculty to impart specific technical and life skills to students. Records of students' attendance are maintained systematically for each course and periodically communicated to the students to remedy the shortfall of 75% minimum requirement if any. Further, extra classes are conducted to cover the shortfall for students admitted after the last day of admissions (late admitted students). Remedial sessions are conducted for the benefit of slow learners and students deficient in academic performance based on their ISA results. Special inputs are given to advance learners. The advanced learners are also chosen for peer tutoring. Audio lectures are provided for visually impaired students. Some teachers have recorded their lectures and practicals for the benefit of the students. As required under the CBCS, components related to gender, environment, sustainability, human values

etc., are integrated in the teaching-learning process, as well as NSS, NCC and other co-curricular programmes. Academic Audit is conducted by inviting external academic experts and suggestions are implemented.

Feedback Obtained

Online feedback on curriculum is obtained from students at the end of each semester, on each course, with effect from December 2018. The feedback broadly covers curriculum delivery, lecturing methodology, teacher attributes, availability of resources, etc. The College considers the student feedback as an important document in the process of continuous quality enhancement. The feedback related to the relevance of the syllabus and course is communicated to the Goa University, informally through participation of our teachers in academic bodies such as Board of Studies, Academic Council, and Subcommittees for incorporating changes/corrections as and when required for the purpose of syllabus upgradation. The College also takes into account the feedback of Students, Alumni/ Employers /Teachers B.Sc Teachers BA on curriculum and facilities/infrastructure etc. while planning infrastructure upgradation.

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2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

As a college affiliated to Goa University, the college is bound by the Statutes and Ordinances laid down by the university from time to time. The college hence complies with the guidelines prescribed by the Ordinances related to periodical assessments and semesterend examinations. At the institution level, the college has initiated various reforms with regard to the continuous internal evaluation process (CIE). As a part of this continuous internal evaluation process, students are encouraged to take up topics for assignments of contemporary relevance related to their course/project and make use of eresources, books as a part of their assignment. Through Blended learning strategies, student's skills are continuously assessed in innovative ways such as classbased performance in group's as well individual activities in the form of debates, discussions, paper presentations and roleplay. MCQ's and short answer tests/problems in turn help in assessing the understanding levels and levels of difficulty.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The College follows the academic calendar prescribed by Goa University. Typically, the academic calendar prescribes the dates of commencement of classes for odd and even semesters, dates of commencement of Semester End Examinations for odd and even semesters, the dates for winter and summer breaks. On the basis of the academic calendar prescribed by the University, the college prepares its schedule for continuous internal evaluation (CIE) which includes IntraSemester Assessment (ISA), practical sessions, etc. The first and second ISA is usually completed by the end of September for the Odd semester and by the end of March for the even semester. The Semesterend Examination (SEE) is conducted as per the schedule notified by the University.

CRITERION VI – GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

6.1 – Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 – Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500 words)

The Management of the College emphasizes on the enhanced development of the College by encouraging the active participation of its stakeholders in designing longlasting strategies. The Administrator, representing the Management, participates in all key meetings and deliberations and serves as a significant link between the College and the Management. The Administrator, the Principal, the Vice Principals, the IQAC Coordinator and the Heads of Departments work in collaboration to achieve the common objectives of the institution. Examples of decentralization and participative management in the College (1) Project for renovation and upgradation of infrastructure of the College The College emphasizes on the need for renovation and upgradation of the infrastructure and has thus formulated a detailed proposal to undertake extensive repair and reconstruction works using the funds provided by Rashtriya Uchchatar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA) bolstered by the management granted funds. An internal committee was constituted under the leadership of the then Principal to draft a proposal to procure the RUSA funds. After the funds were received another committee was established by the College that oversaw the utilization of RUSA funds. The committee comprised of the Principal, Administrator, HODs, other senior faculty members and the accountant. The Infrastructure Committee along with the RUSA Committee held meetings to discuss the utilization of the RUSA funds in the renovation and upgradation of the infrastructure of the College. Suggestions of the teaching staff were taken during staff meetings with regards to the retrofitting, renovation and creation of classrooms and laboratories and the equipments needed in the College. These suggestions were taken cognizance of by the Infrastructure and RUSA committee and conveyed to the management and in the Local Managing Committee meetings, further course of action regarding the implementation of the same was taken. The contractors were then assigned the retrofitting and upgradation work by the Management. (2) Skill Development Courses (SDC) The College emphasizes on the need to have skill development courses for the students to gain proficiency in different skills. Hence, the faculty members are encouraged to design the same to enhance the curriculum. The College proposed 25 skill development courses, each of a minimum of 30 hours duration. The SDC are managed through decentralization and participative management. Selection of SDC is done in a systematically: the faculty member proposing a SDC submits a proposal to the Head of their respective department. The proposal should include the syllabus, course

objectives, teaching methodology, parameters of evaluation, learning outcomes, faculty resources, student intake, fee structure, and the course schedule. Each proposal is then discussed at the departmental meeting and if found appropriate, is submitted to the Skill Development Courses Cell. The Coordinator, after convening a meeting with the Convenor of the SDC Cell, forwards the proposal to the Principal. The Principal, the Convenor and the faculty of the department concerned, then closely scrutinize the proposal and undertake the necessary administrative arrangements for conducting the course. Once the proposal is approved by the Principal, the responsibility of planning, financing and managing the course rests with the Course Coordinator.

The plastic and glass waste is collected by the Corporation of the City of Panaji, regularly. Use of ebooks and inflibnet is emphasised for students. The classrooms are equipped with LCD projectors and the teachers disseminate classroom notes and presentations via Moodle (Dhempe Learn) and Google Classroom. The College has its own websites where all the events and other announcements are notified digitally. The library is in the process of transforming into electronic library using KOHA software. We are in the process of installing CAMU software for recording attendance. 4. Stations of potable drinking water are placed in the campus to avoid the use of plastic bottles. The Canteen has adopted single use plasticfree and strawfree policy. 5. Solid waste is segregated at source and is collected by Panaji Municipality.

7.2 – Best Practices

7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

Best Practice Title: Efforts towards Ecological Sustenance Objectives of the Practice: • Contribute to greener environment and offer safe work place and work practices. • To make the campus and surrounding eco friendly • To reduce the energy and water consumption in the college campus. • To minimize use of chemical pollutants in college campus. • To create awareness amongst the staff students of the college about their responsibility towards implementation of environment policy. • To make researchers aware about the environmental problems and work towards seeking solutions and remedies. • To train all staff and students with green practices empower them to contribute and participate in a mission to reduce adverse impact on environment. The Context: With the dichotomy between environmental sustenance and economic development augmenting the need to internalise ecologically healthy practices is more pressing than ever. Thus, the responsibility of creating, maintaining and promoting a synergetic interface with the natural ecosystem lies heavily with educational institutions which kindle and shape young thought. Therefore, since its inception in 1962, Dempo Charities Trust's Dhempe College of Arts and Science has been involved in practices that seek to contribute towards environmental sustainability. The College has been emphasizing on creating an environmental awareness not only in the campus but also in the society. The largest focus has been on creating responsiveness through workshops, seminars, awarenessdrives, active research, pilot projects and treeplantation initiatives. These endeavours have been extended to society through vigorous handson collaborations and socialwelfare programmes mainly through activities by the Staff, NSS unit and NCC wing Following a systematic appraisal and audit of these efforts, in 2015 the institution became the first College in Goa to be awarded Green Certification GSCP012010 of Green Standard Certification Programme. As of today, in light of the institution sustaining and upgrading its green practices, level III of Green Certification has been achieved The Practice Green Audit Committee encouraged all the departments to do environment related activities. These activities are classified as : o Environmental related research projects and research publications. o Various training programmes for staff and students. o Talks by experts o Various competitions for students. o Field trips ? 35 students have been identified as Green Ambassadors who propagate environmental awareness among other students. ? They are grouped into various committees such as i) Landscaping ii) Carbon Footprint Calculation iii) Renewable Energy iv) Waste Management v) Water Conservation vi) Swachha Bharat Abhiyan under the guidance of staff members and are trained in these activities. ? Various other activities are organized throughout the year such as training programmes, field trips, workshops, film shows, tree plantations and cleanliness drives. ? Green Audit Committee members conducted

the orientation programme for students with regard to Green Tips and the role which they can play in maintaining clean environment, save energy and conserve water. ? Water quality assessment is done regularly by faculty members from Geology, Biotechnology and Chemistry Departments. ? Carbon Footprint calculation is carried out for last three years and the knowledge about it is imparted to students. ? Essay competition on 'Climate Change - Problems Solutions' was organized for students and three best essays were sent for the intercollegiate essay competition held at National Center for Polar and Ocean Research (NCPOR). Our student Ms. Rakshanda Naik bagged first prize and Ms.Sakshi Navelkar bagged third prize in the competition held at NCPOR. • Field trip to Butterfly Conservatory was organised at Priol, Ponda for Green Ambassadors. Four faculty members along with 15 students visited the Butterfly Conservatory. • A talk on 'Waste Management' was organized for Green Ambassadors. • Workshop on Carbon Footprint calculations was conducted by faculty members who are members of Green Audit Committee for Green Ambassadors. • A talk on ewaste management by Engineers of Green wave solutions was organized in the College. • International conference on 'Nanomaterials for Environmental Applications' was organized by the College. • 24 Cleanliness drives, 5 Swachhta awareness programs, ODF awareness, Green Day celebration, Green practices promotion has been carried out . Green Audit was conducted by an auditor from Green Standard Certification programme GSCP012010 (URS) Evidence of Success: As a result of all the efforts towards the Ecological Sustenance, the College has been awarded Green Certification: GSCP012010 of level III by Green Standard Certification Programme. Problems Encountered And Resource Required: • Planning required to adjust students' and teachers' timing beyond daily timetable for organizing the activities related to environmental awareness. • Attitude problems noticed in public though all are aware of menace of plastic use, water energy saving and keeping environment clean. Best Practice Title: Skill Development Programmes Objectives of the practice: The skill development programmes are introduced at the undergraduate curriculum mainly: • To develop and actualize the inert potential amongst students apart from the regular curriculum which includes employability skills, entrepreneurship skills, life skills, soft skills, skills to contribute to community service, counselling skills and technical skills. • To create more job givers than job seekers by encouraging students for selfemployment and to venture into startups. The context: The College is affiliated to Goa University and follows the prescribed syllabus. In order to meet ever increasing skill requirements in the current economic environment and the increasing aspirations of our young students it is important to widen the scope of the curriculum. Thus, every department of the College is encouraged to conduct skill development programmes. The practice: The College encourages students to inculcate skills in communication, problem solving, entrepreneurship, sophisticated instrumentation, creativity and IT skills. This practice has been started since 2003 and were then called as Nonconventional Courses. Later these courses were identified as skill enhancement courses and hobby courses, adding value to education. Over the span of last five years, a systematic approach was adopted and Skill Enhancement Programmes of minimum 30 hours have been floated keeping in mind various demands of the society for a purposeful and efficient livelihood. The proposals are submitted to the SDC committee for evaluation and approval. All departments follow the standard format developed by the SDC committee to conduct the course. These include syllabus, implementation schedule, fee structure and budget allocation. Experts from the College and leading Research Institutes and Universities, industries in and around Goa are invited as guest faculties to provide the best possible training to our students. The courses consist of lectures as well as practical hands on sessions and field visits. Courses are conducted during winter/ summer vacations or after regular teaching hours. Tests are conducted for relevant courses and certificates are provided to participants. The skill development

programmes are open to locals and students of other colleges as well. During the academic year 201819, various programmes were organized in the College by various departments. Computer Science department conducted five courses viz Learning of GIMP software, Learning of PHP and My SQL, Course on Multimedia, Programming in 'C', Programming 'C'. These courses are aimed to enhance programming skills of students. Department of Biotechnology conducted Certificate Course and Entrepreneurship Development Program in Winemaking and Bakery. Students were trained to make different types of still wines such as grape, pineapple, dates, watermelon, orange etc. In Bakery, students were given handson training in baking different types of items. Basic aim of this course was to encourage participants to start their own enterprise even from home Department of Botany oganised Certificate course in Orchids, Anthurium Cultivation, Flower Arrangements and Creative Kitchen. This certificate course offers handson practical training programs on different techniques in gardening. This course gives the impetus for students to get a better job opportunity, set up their own farm in their segment of interest to develop their career. This department also organized Certificate course in Fungi : Basic techniques in Mycology and Mushroom Cultivation which offers handson practical training programs to enhance different techniques to use fungi as food. Department of Geology conducted course on 'Remote Sensing and GIS'. Students were taught to interpret geological information through satellite imageries. They also got basic working knowledge of GIS platform. It is an aid for further degree in remote sensing and GIS after which they can be employed as GIS analyst, GIS operator and GIS specialist in various fields. Department of Chemistry conducted courses on Analytical Tools and Determination of Physicochemical and Microbiological parameters in drinking water. The course on Analytical Tools helped students to gain adequate knowledge to operate instruments like XRD, XRFS, SEM, Magnetic studies. Department of Mathematics organized course on Mathematical Typesetting - LATEX. The students were trained to use LaTeX and various templates acquired from the course to compose Mathematical documents, presentations, and reports. This department also organized courses on Statistical Techniques using R software which helped students to understand various concepts in statistical techniques and statistical surveys. Department of Indian Languages conducted a course on Typing in Devanagari 'Mangal' font (Unicode). Department of Psychology held a Certificate course in Learning Difficulties: Assessment And Remediation. After attending this course students were able to assess learning difficulties and use appropriate remedial teaching. Trained participants can work as Resource Room Teachers in schools as well

7.3 – Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 – Provide the details of the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust in not more than 500 words

The uniqueness lay in its focus on socially relevant extension programme in accord with institutions vision and objectives. Over a period, faculty members have started many such activity that has taken distinct shape with time. Its relevance is connection between education and its social relevance and student's participation. A few examples of these programmes are described below: A faculty member from the Department of Botany has preserved germplasm of 30 varieties of local Goan rice that can also grow in the Khazan lands and in fields irrigated with fresh water. Local farmers are motivated to cultivate varieties of traditional Goan rice. She started a Gauseva Mahasangh 350

injured/ stray cows, surrounding Bicholim taluka are provided medical treatment and rearing later. A faculty member from the Department of Geology has undertaken water analysis of springs and water bodies in Pernem, Sattari, Bardez and Bicholim Taluka of Goa, in collaboration with a faculty member of the Department of Chemistry. Different physicochemical and biological parameters of estimating potability of drinking water is studied. The data generated was used to educate the villagers. He has an ongoing Research Project, "Assessment of water quality in Bardez and Tiswadi taluka of Goa, India" sponsored by Department of Higher Education, Govt. of Goa. A faculty member from the Department of History is an active member of Heritage Action Group and works on Heritage conservation. He worked towards maintenance and preservation of various heritage sites in Goa, create awareness among students and general public about heritage conservation and save coconut Chipko Andolan. He is receiver of Goemkarponn award by 'Transform Goa' in collaboration with 'Goa for Giving' also felicitated as one of the Eminent Goan Personalities for Goa by EcoTreks contributed a chapter History and Heritage of Goa in the book entitled 'Public History of Goa'. He has published a book 'Goa Gold Goa Silver Her History Her Heritage from earliest times to 2019'. A faculty from the Department of Psychology leads a Mental Health Awareness programme in association with an NGO Sangath. The faculty participated in Mindscope 3rd Mental Health film festival wherein movies on mental health were screened. With Muktha Foundation, Bangalore an awareness programme on 'Prevention of Child Sexual Abuse' as part of 'Child Safety, National Priority, Nationwide campaign' was organised. Dhempe College was its regional partner. Training was provided in identifying and prevent CSA. DISHA (a school for disabled students) in one initiative for display and sale of items prepared by divyang students. Hamara School for the underprivileged, students undertake development programmes. A faculty member from the Department of Philosophy is a founder and leader of an initiative titled "Uzwaad" which focuses on suicide prevention, plasticfree Goa, beach cleaning drive, preservation of Goan Heritage through road shows etc. Along with Green Waves Environmental Solutions, a streetplay entitled

'Save Goa and its Environment' was performed by the crew at Miramar beach and SwimSea resort, Dona Paula. The students were exposed the realities and socioeconomic challenges faced by the rural communities in Goa
