If yes, give a brief descripiton and a list of modules currently operational (maximum 500 words)	The College has a partial Management Information System that disseminates information to the Management as well as to the regulatory authorities such as Goa University and the Directorate of Higher Education, Government of Goa. The Management Information System comprises monthly reports by Heads of Departments and conveners of various committees to the Principal. The reports essentially contain a monthly account of curricular, cocurricular and extracurricular activities organized/attended by teachers/students of the respective departments. The departmental reports are compiled and a summative monthly report is filed by the Principal to the Management. Such reports are generally forwarded to the Principal Trustees by email. The Administrator appointed by the Management is the link between the Management and the College and provides regular inputs to the Management on activities of the College, quality initiatives and accomplishments, as well as on plans and activities that have a financial implication for the Management. The Principal and the Administrator generally exercise budgetary control, especially on receipts and expenditure from grantinaid of the State Government, and grants received from the Management or

other sources. As a college affiliated to Goa University and grantinaid institution under the Government of Goa, the College also files periodic reports to the University and the Directorate of Higher Education. Most of the reporting to these authorities is through email, while some are through the University Management System (UMS) portal of Goa University.

Part B

CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 - Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The curriculum delivered and prescribed by Goa University is implemented by the college through PDCA (Plan-Do-Check-Act) mechanism. This broadly involves the following: 1) At the commencement of each semester, the time-table framework committee prepares general timetables/academic schedules which are circulated to all HODs. The academic schedule includes the schedule of internal tests and assignments. 2) The Head of the respective department prepares departmental time-table based on the general time-table. Teaching/academic work is allocated to the respective departmental staff along with other duties and responsibilities. 3) Each faculty member prepares an academic lesson plan to be approved by the HOD. Lessons are delivered as per the approved plan. The HOD, the Vice Principal and the Principal monitor the delivery of lectures and completion of the syllabus. If, on account of any exigency, a lecture cannot be held as per the notified plan, it is rescheduled with proper justification duly recorded in the documented plan, and with the approval of the head of the department concerned. 4) Each faculty member also prepares plans for delivery of the course, including usage of education technology (Moodle, Flipped Learning, online learning resources, etc.), field trips, industrial visits etc. 5) Each department also notifies schedule for enrichment courses skill Development which are designed by the departmental faculty to impart specific skills to students. 6) Records of students' attendance are maintained systematically for each course and periodically communicated to the students. 7) Students granted admissions after the commencement of the academic session (First Year BA/BSc) are provided with additional teaching/instruction to cover the backlog of the syllabus. 8) Remedial sessions are conducted informally for the benefit of students deficient in academic performance. 9) As required under the Choice Based Credit System components related to gender, environment, sustainability etc., are integrated in the teaching-learning process, as well as in NSS, NCC and other co-curricular programmes (PEP Report). 10) Student feedback is obtained on teaching and PEP curriculum delivery. The Principal reviews the performance of teachers with a score of less than 3 (on 4-point scale), discusses individually with the teacher concerned and suggests remedies for improvement. With this approach, improvement in teachers' score has been observed.

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

Online feedback on curriculum is obtained from students at the end of each semester, on each course, with effect from December 2018. The feedback broadly covers curriculum delivery, lecturing methodology, teacher attributes, availability of resources, etc. The College considers the student feedback as an important document in the process of continuous quality enhancement. The feedback related to the relevance of the syllabus and course is communicated to the Goa University, informally through participation of our teachers in academic bodies such as Board of Studies, Academic Council, and Subcommittees etc for incorporating changes/corrections as and when required for the purpose

of syllabus up gradation. The data pertaining to the online student feedback on a course is collated in excel sheet and provides aggregate score of each teacher on a scale of 4. Each teacher is provided with a copy of the aggregate score against each parameter of evaluation, and is expected to analyze the feedback. While each teacher is expected to strive for continuous improvement in student ratings, teachers with summative score of <3 on a scale of 4 are required to analyze the results and discuss with the Principal strategies to address deficiencies and achieve higher ratings in the next semester. The Principal suitably guides the teacher and monitors the steps taken by the teacher to address the deficiencies. General improvement in student rating of teachers has been observed. Teachers who need improvement are advised to download videos and observe how a topic is dealt with by experts and the teaching methodology adopted. As part of the efforts to improve the teacher attributes in general, the College has initiated plans for deputation of teachers for training at institutions of eminence. Blending of Information and Communication Technology (ICT) with conventional methods is encouraged. Further, the College has adopted flipped mode of learning as a strategy for better studentteacher interaction. The College also takes into account the feedback of Students , Alumni / Employers /Teachers B.sc Teachers BA on curriculum and facilities/infrastructure etc. while planning infrastructure up gradation.

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2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Yes, the College has a wellestablished student mentoring programme which is designed to ensure that students realize their academic potential through academic mentoring by teachers, and, where required, through counseling to overcome personal problems that may otherwise impede the student's academic achievements. Objective: To provide each student with a teacher mentor who provides support in academic and other aspects of college life and helps students to set goals and develop action plans to achieve these goals. At the beginning of the academic year, the Mentoring Committee notifies the list of faculty mentors and the corresponding mentee students assigned to each mentor. The ratio of mentor: mentee is 1:10 for science and 1: 20 in the Arts section. Every student of the college is assigned a mentor, preferably a teacher currently teaching the mentee. This is done since feedback from the participants indicated that it is easier to build rapport and to meet the mentees if they were in their class. Two mentor's meetings are conducted every year, one each semester. During the first meeting, the convenor of the programme briefs new staff members regarding the mentoring process and all mentors are given their list of mentees, mentoring reports and personal action plans to be filled in as records, and for follow up. The second meeting is mainly for feedback suggestions and difficulties regarding the programme. • Each faculty mentor is provided with guidelines governing the mentorship programme. • Each faculty mentor is required to hold at least one meeting with the mentees per month. • Typically, one meeting is held upon notification of the list, and a review meeting is held at the end of the semester. 6.1 – Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 – Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500 words)

The College is governed by a progressive and forwardlooking Management that actively supports and promotes participation of key stakeholders in evolving longterm strategies for the College. The key link between the College and the Management, the Administrator appointed by the Management, actively participates in all important meetings, discussions at the College. The Administrator, the Principal, the IQAC Coordinator, Local managing committee, the Vice Principals and the Heads of Departments work as a team to develop plans, programmes and strategies for the advancement of the College. Examples of decentralization and participative management in the College (1) Project for renovation and upgradation of infrastructure of the College under RUSA Phase I. The proposal to undertake major renovation and upgradation of infrastructure of the College under RUSA Phase I was first discussed in the meeting of the faculty. The head of each department was requested to submit inputs regarding departmental requirements in terms of upgradation, in consultation with the faculty and nonteaching staff (such as laboratory assistants/attendants) of the respective departments. Inputs received from the heads of departments, in consultation with the respective departmental faculty, were then collated and submitted to the Infrastructure Committee of the College. Upon review of the departmental plans by the Infrastructure Committee, the consolidated plan for

upgradation/renovation works was submitted to the architect's/project management consultant appointed by the College for the purpose. On the basis of inputs received from the College, the architects/project management consultant prepared a plan and estimates for renovation and upgradation of infrastructure comprising structural retrofitting, civil, electrical and carpentry works. The estimate of the renovation and upgradation works was then placed before the Management for its sanction on expenditure over and above the limit of expenditure under RUSA. After the approval of the Management on total expenditure, the proposal for undertaking renovation and upgradation of the College was placed before the Local Managing Committee of the College for its approval on expenditure under RUSA. Upon completion of the process of tendering, the schedule for renovation/upgradation as devised by the Project Management Consultant was shared with the heads of department, faculty and staff to facilitate completion of the tasks in a phased manner, as per plan. (2) Skill Development Courses The College encourages its faculty to design and deliver short duration certificate skill development courses for the benefit of students, in order to enrich the curriculum. These courses impart additional knowledge of a subject besides the academic syllabus which can give them an edge as they acquire additional skill along with a degree. Students are free to choose any course as per their interest, irrespective of their subjects and departments. The College presently offers about 20 Skill Development courses (30 Hours). Faculty members interested in offering a skill development course submits a proposal to the head of the department. The proposal is discussed at the departmental meeting and, if found suitable, submitted to the Principal. After Principals approval the planning, financing and management of the course is done by the course coordinator.

In order to provide timely results, an elaborate, wellplanned mechanism of exam schedules, assessment schedules and a marks entry mechanism is already in place. ? Appropriate software for

generating results and mark lists is in place and is updated from time to time. ? Trained, full time administrative staff have been appointed exclusively for examination purposes to facilitate examination and evaluation work. The students' grievances with regard to examinations are redressed through a separately constituted Examination Grievance Redressal Committee. ?

Research and Development

As part of its quality improvement strategy, the Research Cell undertakes periodic training of faculty members in the working of instruments. ? The college Research Cell is led by faculty with rich research experience. ? As a part of its quality improvement strategy, the college encourages faculty members to attend workshops and seminars ad also organize in house training. ? The college has acquired highend research instruments and software to enhance research capacity, using RUSA funds. ? A qualified technician has been appointed to ensure the operation and maintenance of the instruments installed in the research room/instrumentation centre. The college encourages its faculty members to undertake research projects, pursue Ph.D. and Postdoctoral research, to help usher in a research culture and to provide better research guidance to the students of TYBA and TYBSc in their research projects.

Infrastructure / Instrumentation

The strategy adopted for library, ICT and infrastructure/ instrumentation is aimed at acquiring and implementing uptodate soft wares, procedures and technologies. ? Students were given access to Inflibnet to help facilitate the research undertaken for their TY projects. ? Workshops on Kopy Kitab and Inflibnet were held to familiarize the staff and students with the same. ? Research journal subscriptions were renewed. Several rare books have been identified and have been earmarked for digitization. ? ICT tools like Moodle, Google Classroom, Polls Everywhere, Padlet, Edmodo, and Whatsapp are used to facilitate the transfer of reference material and important communications. ? Laptops and LCD projectors are used extensively by faculty members to support classroom teaching. ? Since the College building is nearly 60 years old, structural retrofitting was undertaken as part of ongoing renovation and upgradation of the infrastructure. Highend instruments were purchased using RUSA funds. ?

Human Resource Management

Continuous training and skill improvement is the strategy that the college adopts with regard to human resource management. ? The Principal underwent training in Education and Industrial Development. ? Postgraduate programme: Initiative was taken to offer postgraduate course M.Sc. (Analytical Chemistry) from the academic year 201819. Approval of Goa University was obtained and all groundwork including setting up of laboratories, classrooms, as well as establishment of industrial linkages, was completed in time for launch of the programme from the academic year 201819. International Collaboration/Exchange programmes (Sakura Science Plan): Nine students of third year B.Sc. along with Mr. Vishnu R. Chari, Assistant Professor, visited Bio Nano Electronics Research Centre, Tokyo University, Japan, from February 02 to 09, 2018. The program was fully funded by Japan Science and Technology Agency. The main purpose of this student exchange programme was to introduce Indian students to Japanese Culture, as well as to the opportunities available in Japan for higher studies and career prospects. Dnyandaan: During the year, the College formalized Dnyandaan, a new initiative to provide financial assistance by teachers of the College to needy students. This year 19 faculty members contributed towards it and the total amount accumulated was Rs.1,80,000. Instrumentation Room for strengthening of research capabilities: The Instrumentation room is equipped with facilities like FT IR spectrophotometer, Atomic Absorption spectrophotometer, UVVIS spectrophotometer, Gas Chromatograph and Elevator rotary vacuum evaporator purchased through RUSA scheme. All equipment's are currently used for research activities undertaken by faculty and students of college from different departments.
